Speakers Bureau Newsletter

The Spanish National Sexual Assault Hotline, previously known as "La Línea de Ayuda Nacional de Asalto Sexual," is changing its name to "Línea de Ayuda Nacional de Abuso Sexual" due to the ambiguity of the word "asalto," which can mean robbery or assault in English. Amy Andrades, the National Sexual Assault Hotline Program Director, stated that the change aims to align the terminology with native speakers and to help people find the right resources.

She also discussed the challenges faced by the hotline and the impact of its services on Spanish-speaking communities. The hotline has had difficulty with outreach and engaging Spanish-speaking communities. Cristina Manzur, RAINN's bilingual language outreach coordinator, explained that the hotline is working to connect with marginalized communities and partner with organizations that have more knowledge about the needs of the Spanish-speaking population.

Regarding the impact of the hotline and other initiatives on the broader social issue of sexual assault towards Spanish speakers, Amy highlighted that discussing sexual assault is a taboo subject in many families, and coming to the hotline can educate visitors and change their mindset about the resources and support available. Both emphasized the importance of promoting the hotline and its resources to Spanishspeaking communities, and they plan to launch a campaign that will help them reach more people. The campaign will involve a collaboration between RAINN and Spanish-speaking partners, with a focus on opening up conversations about sexual assault and normalizing discussions about the topic.

The two also discussed the challenges of providing culturally competent resources and finding resources in Spanish. Cristina Manzur stated that the hotline is working to promote resources on their website that are translated into Spanish and support loved ones affected by sexual assault. She emphasized that all services are free and that the Hotline provides services in both English and in Spanish. They stressed the importance of addressing functionality, as many people from the Spanish-speaking community cannot afford to look for help, and it's invaluable to provide resources to them in their native language.

In conclusion, the name change of the Spanish National Sexual Assault Hotline is an effort to better align terminology with native speakers and to reach more people in Spanish-speaking communities. Amy and Cristina emphasized the importance of promoting the hotline's services and resources, creating a campaign to normalize discussions about sexual assault, and working to provide culturally competent resources in Spanish to support survivors of sexual violence.

This will be a discussion featuring Speakers Bureau members <u>Joshua Lamont</u>, <u>Zachary Mallory</u>, and Kai Kazumi on how one can work through the barriers of disclosure, the importance of gender-affirming and identity-inclusive care, and healing after trauma.

Survivor Love Letter Workshop

Earlier this year, RAINN participated in <u>#SurvivorLoveLetter</u>, a powerful social media campaign that flooded the internet with love for survivors on Valentine's Day. This effort was started by filmmaker and activist <u>Tani</u> <u>Ikeda</u> in 2012 on the anniversary of her rape, where she penned a letter to her younger self that ended with the words: "This is my survivor love letter."

Now, we are excited to take this partnership further. We are proud to announce that Tani Ikeda will be teaming up with RAINN to facilitate a series of Survivor Love Letter Workshops. These aren't just ordinary workshops - they are unique meditative and writing sessions designed to foster a deeper connection with our younger selves, serving as a nurturing ground for creative resilience. The first workshop in this inspiring series is slated for Tuesday, June 27th, from 3 pm - 5 pm PST / 6 pm - 8 pm EST.

I felt empowered. If Time Magazine is interested in hearing my insights, I know I am doing the work I want to be doing in the world.


What do you want to tell other survivors interested in telling their stories?


If you could meet any person, living or dead, who would you choose and why?

What does your self-care look like?

When I have time to squeeze in a self-care day, I can be found either playing Xbox, reading a book, or getting a good workout! I highly favor self-care days because they are very important for our well-being and psyche due to the great work we put in when talking with visitors and survivors.

Can you tell us about a time you felt appreciated doing the work that you do?

I feel very appreciated when I hear the visitor tell me that I have been very supportive and helpful and that they are feeling better after our conversation. These instances remind us of the great work we do on the OHL. Although it's just words and a sentence, those words make me highly appreciate my role with RAINN and make me appreciate that RAINN is here for those in need.

Do you have any words of encouragement for RAINN Speakers Bureau Members?

Keep up the great work, and thank you for all you do for the survivors and staff! The survivor stories the Speakers Bureau presents are very helpful and encouraging for both staff and survivors! Thank you for giving the survivors a voice and a platform!

Can you tell us about a time you felt appreciated doing the work that you do?

While I worked on the hotline, I used to write down feedback that I received from chats - either from hotline visitors or even from my fellow staff. I still have the notebook that I kept that feedback in, and I look at it when I'm having a rough time and need a pick-me-up.

On the Consulting Team, we provide training on sexual misconduct awareness, prevention, and response to various organizations and communities - and I've had the opportunity to receive some really wonderful feedback from training participants, which is always really special. It's so nice to hear that a training I've worked on has had an impact on someone, or that they learned something from it, or found the content to be really impactful.

What prompted you to join RAINN?

I had previously worked on a domestic violence / sexual assault hotline in my hometown, and I had just finished grad school, and I was living in DC - so since I knew this was an issue that I was really passionate about, and I knew of RAINN, and the work that they were already doing, I figured it wouldn't hurt to apply for a hotline position. I was truly over the moon when I got the job - and I've been here ever since!

Do you have any words of encouragement for RAINN Speakers Bureau Members?

I have such a tremendous amount of respect and admiration for members of the Speakers Bureau - it takes a tremendous amount of power and courage to volunteer and share such personal and vulnerable experiences with others, all with the goal of changing the way that society thinks and speaks about this issue. That amount of resilience and strength is inspiring - and I hope that you all are able to recognize that strength within yourself.
